SNRR President's Report

Another season has flown by and I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the referees and coaches for their efforts throughout the 2023 season. It was good to have a season go by without disruptions from either Covid or the weather. I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow committee members, Stephen Jackson (Secretary), Phil Greenwood (Treasurer) , Craig Hughes (Vice President) and Andrew Winslade (Head of Referee Coaching) for their valuable contributions

We finished the season with a very successful night at Forestville RSL and we were fortunate to have one of our own as our guest speaker Will Houston who gave an outstanding and sometimes colourful insight into his Rugby Refereeing career. (He actually picked that Wayne Barnes would referee the World Cup final). You can find all the award winners on our website and I would like to pass my congratulations to all of them. I would also like to acknowledge the work of Phil Greenwood and Stephen Jackson in bringing this event together

Last year's presentations saw the introduction of the Life Membership award which saw four inductees. This year Colin Mackenzie was made a Life Member. Colin Mackenzie has been an integral part of SNRR for many seasons as a referee, a coach , committee member and Head of Coaching. On behalf of everyone at SNRR I offer our sincerest thanks and congratulations .

The end of season sees SNRR in a financially strong position. I will not go into detail as this will be provided by Phil Greenwood in his Treasury report. I would like to take this opportunity to thank our sponsors for their generous support over the season and for their continued support going forward. I am pleased to announce that the Chairman of the SJRU Board George Roper has advised that as of next season referee payments for their Main Competition (U10 to Opens) will be increased 30% per game. This is the first increase for quite a few years.

Our Head of Coaching Andrew Winslade has prepared his coaching report which appears later in the Annual Report. I would like to acknowledge the amount of work Andrew Winslade has put in over the season not just as Head of Referee coaching but all the other work he has done behind the scenes in terms of education nights, accreditation courses etc. Andrew Winslade deservedly was awarded the "Best Contributor Award" for the 2023 season. The SNRR needs more coaches especially as our number of registered referees continues to climb. So if you want to coach next year please approach Andrew.


As mentioned above our number of registered referees for SNRR has continued to climb with over 61% under the age of 22. It is so pleasing to see so many younger referees coming through . As a percentage the number of female referees is still too low and this is an area the committee will be working on next year.

Appointments for games are always tricky (cancellations/unavailability) and I would like to acknowledge the work of Hamish Mackay. It is not an easy task.

Couple of years ago the SSS programme was stopped but I am pleased to advise that the Sydney Youth Academy under the leadership of Tom Chadwick is now officially up and running and expect to see a few SNRR referees nominated for next season. SNRR contributed some funds to help with the launch of Sydney Youth Academy in conjunction with Sydney West and NSW Rugby.

Next season is only around the corner and we intend to have our GMG day on Sunday 10th March 2024 at St Ives Bowling Club . Book it into your diaries now as I know none of you want to miss the event!

To everyone within the SNRR family thank you for all your efforts and dedication over the last season. Without your generosity of time the game which is played in Heaven could not be played. Enjoy the off season, if in fact we have an off season with all the seven's competitions, and I look forward to seeing you all on the paddock next season fit and raring to go.

SNRR Treasurer's Report

Sydney North Rugby Referees achieved a surplus for the financial year ended 31 October 2023 of \$15,481 (2022: \$11,705).

At the end of the financial year, SNRR had Retained Surpluses of \$128,430 which is supported by Cash at Bank of \$39,236 (2022: \$106,601), Term Deposits of \$80,000 (2022: \$Nil) and the written-down value of Referee Communication and Video Kits of \$7,584 (2022: \$9,133). Therefore, the Association is in a very strong financial position.

The main sources of income were:

• Contributions to Referee Payments	\$43,111
• Contributions to Referee Coach Payments	\$2,948
• Grants Received	\$10,000
• Sponsorship	\$29,699

I would like to acknowledge the support that SNRR receives as a grant from NSW Rugby Union and as sponsorship from Patties Foods (Four'N Twenty Pies). These supporters enable the Association to top up match payments of our Referees and Referee Coaches. While SNRR continues to receive this valuable support, from Patties in particular, the Committee intends to continue topping up match payments.

During the financial year, SNRR invoiced for 1,123 club and school games (excluding rep games and midweek school games), 194 gala games, 130 SJRU Frosty 7s, 84 SJRU Sizzling 7s and 140 Chloe Dalton 7s (secondary school girls). Fifteen Referee coaches submitted 136 coaching reports (2022: 16 referee coaches; 143 reports).

We would like to acknowledge Angus Hordern, Cameron Read, Chris Hedge, David Reeve, Gary Stewart, Greg Burton, Jim Rist, Paul Gregg, Paul Hitchcock, Peter Hill, Sam Shepherd, Simon Germaine, Stephen Jackson and Trent Muskens who generously donated their referee and referee coaching payments to the NSW Positive Rugby Foundation in 2023 and / or 2022.

The main expenses were:

• Contributions to Referee Pathways	\$4,111
• Donations to the NSW Positive Rugby Foundation	\$3,415
• Food and Beverages - Annual Dinner	\$6,070
• Food and Beverages - Meetings and Events	\$3,626
• Payments to Referees	\$44,083
• Payments to Referee Coaches	\$4,388

SNRR continues to invest in referee communication and video kits. In 2023 we purchased additional kits at a cost of \$1,879 and since 2018 we have invested more than \$29,000 in referee communication and video kits.

Where the presentation or classification of items in the financial statements has changed from the previous financial year, the comparative amounts have also been updated to achieve comparability with the current financial year.


As required, the Committee has formed the following opinion regarding the financial statements before they have been submitted to the Annual General Meeting for approval:

SNRR Secretary's Report

2023 was a very busy rugby season for SNRR referees, but a very successful season overall.

Personally, I have been refereeing for over 30 years, and the standard of SNRR refereeing is as good as I've ever seen. The combination of referee coaching, education nights, GMG (game management guidelines), current and previous committee members have all helped achieve a high standard to our rather complex game.

There are many people to thank for this success including NSWRR, SNRR Referee Coaches, SNRR Committee (previous and current), casual mentors, as well as the various groups overseeing the development of junior referees who referee the U8 & U9 age groups.

2023 SNRR membership hit 187, the largest registration on record. Interestingly,

- 114 (61%) members are 22 years old and younger. This is a very encouraging development to have such a high number of younger referees in SNRR. It is also challenging for SNRR referee coaches to mentor and steer so many newer referees.
- 50 (27%) members are 50 years old and older (50-70 years old), Amazingly, this group is likely to have 1500 seasons of senior and junior refereeing history. That is an incredible statistic, rugby is lucky to have this commitment!

Special mention should go to those members who went beyond the call of duty:

Most games refereed: Jason Gay (45), James Scholtens, Scott Williams, Sarah Randall (all 37), Leslie Tomlinson (32).

Most Referee Coaching: Colin Mackenzie (35)

Most RefLive Reports: Colin Mackenzie (22)

Referee Coaching is critical to the success of the game of rugby, and SNRR Referee coaches are to be applauded for their commitment. Many of the coaches complete multiple coaching sessions every weekend.

The lack of availability of refereeing kit for new referees at the GMG, Gear Steward, and Education nights complicated life for the committee and new referees. It is hoped new referee kit will be easily available in 2024.

Special thanks to Hamish Mackay, NSWRR Junior Appointment Officer for all his hard work throughout the season. Overall, the season appointment was very well run. And special thanks to my fellow committee members for all their support on my first year on the SNRR committee

SNRR Referee Coaching Report

The experienced referees and coaches within SNRR have continued to excel and enhance their skills throughout the season. The coach's support to our referees in refining their knowledge of the game, improving decision-making, and sharpening their on-field presence has had a significant impact. The progress of experienced referees not only benefits SNRR but also elevates the overall quality of rugby matches they officiate. The association has seen a steady influx of enthusiastic newcomers who have shown tremendous growth and promise.

While the season has been largely successful, SNRR has identified areas for improvement. Ensuring consistent access to quality coaching and development opportunities for all referees remains a priority and a challenge. The association also recognizes the need to expand its outreach in developing new coaches and programs.

In support of our referees, SNRR had 14 Active referee coaches and 4 mentors. We also had 2 members completing their Level 2 Coaching accreditation, 2 members complete Level 1, and 1 member also commencing their Level 2 coaching accreditation.

SNRR delivered a total of 221 coaching reports submitted across 122 active referees (111 in tiers 1-5, with 14 new tier 6 refs also doing some first games).

SNRR also provided referees and coaches to the TAS carnival (Armidale), PSSA XVs in Camden, PSSA 7s Mudgee, Australian Schools Rugby Championships (Wahroonga), the NSW XVs Junior State Champs (state-wide) and the NSW 7s Junior State Champs in Forster and course we were well represented in the SJRU finals and grand finals.

Towards the end of 2023, we have seen the creation of the new Sydney Youth Academy for referees which will be run by Tom Chadwick (NSWRRA), and assisted by previous SNRR members Mitch DeLorenzo, Caitlin Winslade and Toby Brandon-Cooper (all NSWRRA members). This will involve nominated referees from school yrs. 10 to 12. I expect to see several SNRR referees selected and wish them well in this exciting new development opportunity.

In 2023 our education nights were held at St Ives Rugby Club. Feedback from our members designs the sessions around a combination of specific program education.

Finally, a special thank you to the SNRR committee their support to this role. Thanks to Hamish McKay from SJRU appointments (a lot of stress and last-minute changes behind the scenes he had to deal with), Amy Perrett (RA) who worked and supported the various associations Heads of Coaching, and

a special thanks to Alex Richards at NSWRU Referees for his tremendous and tireless support to offer information, support, and feedback.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Basis of Preparation

In the Committee's opinion, the incorporated association is not a reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements.

These are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared for the purposes of complying with the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 and New South Wales legislation the Associations Incorporation Act 2009, the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 and associated regulations. The Committee has determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the members of Sydney North Rugby Referees Incorporated.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements', AASB 1048 'Interpretation of Standards' and AASB 1054 'Australian Additional Disclosures', as appropriate for not-for profit oriented entities with the exception of the following:

- AAS 22 Related Party Disclosures
- AAS 28 Statement of Cash Flows
- AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for, where applicable, the revaluation of financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income, investment properties, certain classes of property, plant and equipment and derivative financial instruments.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the incorporated association's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

Revenue Recognition

The incorporated association recognises revenue as follows:

Contributions to Referee and Referee Coach Payments

Referee and Referee Coach contributions are recorded as revenue when Sydney North Rugby Referees is entitled to invoice the organisation for the services provided.

Grants Received, Sponsorship Income and Interest Received

Grants Received, Sponsorship Income and Interest Received are recorded as income when received.

Income tax

The incorporated association is exempt from Australian income tax by virtue of section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 as amended.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the incorporated association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the incorporated association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in values and bank overdrafts.

Accounts Receivables

Accounts receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for expected credit losses. Accounts receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days.

The incorporated association has applied the simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses, which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance. To measure the expected credit losses, trade receivables have been grouped based on days overdue.

Referee Communication and Video Kits

All Referee Communication and Video Kits are initially measured at cost and are depreciated over three (3) years.

Trade and Other Payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the incorporated association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature, they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Borrowings

Loans and borrowings are initially recognised at the fair value of the consideration received, net of transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Finance Costs

Finance costs attributable to qualifying assets are capitalised as part of the asset. All other finance costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Fair Value Measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

Goods and Services Tax ('GST') and other similar taxes

Revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities are recognised inclusive of the amount of associated GST as the GST incurred is not payable / recoverable from the tax authority.

Comparative Information

Where the presentation or classification of items in the financial statements has changed from the previous financial year then the comparative amounts have also been updated to achieve comparability with the current financial year.

2. Critical Accounting Judgements, Estimates and Assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires the Committee to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. The Committee continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. The Committee bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. There are no critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions that are likely to affect the current or future financial years.


